Importance of Language Sample

- o Representative of language abilities and needs of the child
- o One assessment tool
- o Used to show growth or change across time
- Used to document therapy outcomes in natural settings
- See SpeechPathology.com presentation "Language Sample Techniques" from August 2014 for additional information (#6768)

Language Transcription

- O Listen/Watch taped sample
- O Include all speakers and context (i.e., adult/clinician, child/client)
- o If using an electronic program, type transcript
- O Make decisions about segmenting utterances
 - Consider using communication units (c-units)
- Make decisions about transcribing and coding based on information needed and conventions of the program that is being used
- o Note errors and preliminary areas of concern
- Include information from transcript and analysis into evaluation reports
