Exceptions:

^{*}Most words that follow this rule are SINGLE syllables. The ones that break the rule are usually MULTI-syllable words (ex. science is two syllables and follows the "open syllable rule" where the word is divided after the letter "i" so it says its name, not its sound.)

^{*}Other exceptions are when the letters "ti or "ci" are used to make the /sh/ sound (ex. patient, glacier, efficient)

^{*} When the "ei" combination makes the "I" says its sound "ih"

⁻ foreign – from the Old French word "forain" from the 1300's which means "outside the country's boundaries". In English, it became mixed with "reign" meaning "rule or power", so it literally means "someone who is from another ruler in another land".

⁻feit (as in counterfeit or forfeit) —forfeit and counterfeit come from Old French spellings. "Forfet" and meaning "to lose by misconduct" and c"ounterfeit" comes from "contre" meaning "against" and "faire" meaning "to make".
